Reading A-Z (Raz-kids)

This is a website that allows students access to hundreds of eBooks! Students can read, listen to, and even record themselves reading these books. They take quizzes along the way to show the progress that they are making. When they click on the page, they simply choose Kids Login, enter their teacher's user name then click on their name and enter their password.
